

As always, the Pride Alumni Band once again made a spectacular appearance at the Cuyahoga Falls Memorial Day Parade. We had a different line up routine this year. Band Show (Ken Snyder)

As always, the Pride Alumni Band did an outstanding job at the 2011 Preview of Bands at Clifford Stadium on Tuesday, 16 August, 2011.

On Sunday at noon when registration began, it did not appear if the weather would cooperate. At one point, it rained so hard that the drain outside the Stow Street entrance to the school backed up and nobody could get in or out. However, the storm moved off and we were able to go outside to the south parking lot and practice. Due to the weather conditions, it was muggy and overcast but fortunately, the temperature was tolerable.

Once again, Brandon DuVall, the director of the Tiger Band, pulled double-duty and directed the Alumni Band as well. The event was followed by chicken and jo-jos in the cafeteria.

On Monday evening, registration went very well. Despite all the rain on Sunday, we were able to practice on the field, even though there were some soggy areas. We had a few sprinkles but nothing too severe. A party followed afterward at the Italian American Center on Ninth Street.

Tuesday night, the evening of the Band Show finally arrived. As always, we had our picture taken in the bleachers under the Tiger emblem. This was followed by the pre-game show featuring the Tiger Band. It is always a thrill when we, the Alumni Band, play *The Star Spangled Banner* along with them. The song was directed by Brandon DuVall.

The first band to perform was the Clipper Band from Lorain Clearview High School. They were followed by the Saint Ignatius Marching Wildcat Band, the Streetsboro High School Marching Rockets, and the Patriot Marching Band from Open Door Christian School. Then it was our turn.

I must admit, the biggest thrill for me during the entire 2011 Alumni Band season, was the cheer that we received from the crowd when we took the field at the Band Show. It sends a chill down my spine every year. A huge part of that reception came from our very own Tiger Band.

We did our running cadence on-field followed by a jump halt and our fanfare. Randy Fillmore, the voice of the Alumni Band introduced us and after four bass drum beats, we took off downfield playing the first segment of *Tiger Rag*. That was followed by the circle-drill to the song *More* and a conversion that put us into a concert formation.

Prior to the playing of the concert number *Endless Love*; we were able to catch our breaths during the presentation of the Pride Achievement Award. The 2011 recipient was Sue Madigan and deservedly so. For years, Sue was the secretary of the Alumni Band and made it all work. Band presidents came and went but she provided the cohesiveness and dedication to hold us together. I think that Sue will be the yardstick by which all future alumni

officers will be measured.

After the concert number, we went through another conversion that set us up for the remainder of *Tiger Rag*, the three count turn around, stomp down, bow and extension. Again, **THE CROWD WENT WILD**. This was followed by the running cadence off field which led us into JW. That's when the adrenaline kicks in. We're exhausted and it really doesn't matter because **IT'S ALL ABOUT BAND!!!**

Following our performance there was a ten minute intermission in order for the crowd to regain their composure. In the second half, we were treated to the Kent Roosevelt Rough Rider Marching Band, the Massillon Tiger Swing Band, the Lancer Band from Nordonia High School, and Green High School Bulldog Band.

Next there was the award presentation. The Alumni Band has two awards other than the Pride Achievement Award: the person who travels the farthest in order to participate in the Band Show and the "most senior" marcher. Jim Kierstead, from Cummington, Massachusetts, covered the most miles in order to march with us. I was the oldest marcher. Actually, Ron Wahl also graduated in 1966, so it came down to birthdays. I'm about two weeks older than him.

The exclamation point to the evening was The Cuyahoga Falls High School Marching Tiger Band. They were completely and totally awesome. After the Band Show the Tiger Band and the Alumni Band gathered in the cafeteria for the annual pizza party. It's always a pleasure.

In all, we had 76 marchers which was somewhat low. However, the threatening weather at Sunday practice probably gets most of the blame. Next year I hope that we get nicer weather and a much larger turnout. This old euphonium player plans on being there.

On behalf of the Alumni Band members and the committee I want to thank Brandon DuVall, Dustin Harris, and the IMP for their hard work preparing for the Band Show and the support that they have given us. I also want to thank the Cuyahoga Falls Board of Education, and the City of Cuyahoga Falls for their continued support.
