Congratulations to the Pride Alumni Band for another outstanding performance at the 2013 Preview of Bands at Clifford Stadium on 20 August, 2013.

The weather cooperated with the temperature in the mid-seventies and moderate humidity. Brandon Duvall, the director of the Tiger Band, once again pulled double-duty and directed the Alumni Band as well. The event was followed with a chicken dinner in the cafeteria.

Practice on Monday evening, which took place in the stadium, also went very well. It was partly cloudy with the temperature around eighty at the beginning of practice. It was a real treat to march on grass and under the lights. A party followed at the Italian American Center on Ninth Street.

Tuesday night, the evening of the Band Show, finally arrived. As always, we had our pictures taken in the bleachers under the Tiger emblem. Again, the weather was excellent; clear skies and mid-seventies. However, someone was missing. Our president, Mark Bowers, was out of town because of work. Those of us who know him understand how badly he felt by not being able to attend. That was the first Band Show that Mark had missed since the administration of Rutherford B. Hayes.

The pre-game show featured our very own, Tiger Band. It is always an honor when we, the Alumni Band, play *The Star Spangled Banner* along with them.

Following the pre-game show the first band to perform was the Bulldog Band from Woodridge High School. Next were the Kent Roosevelt Rough Rider Band, and the Tiger Swing Band from Massillon Washington High School. Then it was our turn.

The greatest thrill for me at any Band Show is the reception from the crowd and the Tiger Band when we take the field. I think that everyone in the Alumni Band gets a huge adrenaline rush from the cheering.

At this time I would like to recognize the excellent job done by Scott Curfman to shorten and clean up our entrance and the conversions. I can't say enough about how much smoother our routine was thanks to him. Thank you Scott.

We did our running cadence on field followed by a jump halt and our fanfare. Randy Fillmore, the voice of the Alumni Band introduced us and after four bass drum beats, we took off downfield playing the first segment of *Tiger Rag*. That was followed by the circle-drill to the song *More* and a conversion that put the band into a concert formation.

Prior to the playing of the concert number *I Believe*, we were able to catch our breaths during the presentation of the Pride Achievement Award. The 2013 recipient was Dean Sterling, 1943 graduate of Cuyahoga Falls High School. Dean was the Tiger Band announcer from 1972 through 1982 and the Alumni Band announcer from 1994 through 2004.

After the concert number, we went through another conversion that set us up for the remainder of *Tiger Rag*, the three-count turn around, stomp down, bow and extension. Again **THE CROWD WENT WILD**. This was followed by the running cadence off field, which led us into J.W. Once again, the adrenaline kicked in. We were exhausted and it really didn't matter because **IT WAS ALL ABOUT BAND**.

Following our performance there was a ten-minute intermission in order for the crowd to regain their composure. In the second half, we were treated to the Springfield Spartan Marching Band, and the Bulldog Band from Green High School.

Next up was the award presentation. The Alumni Band has three awards other than the Pride Achievement Award: the band member that travels the farthest to participate in the Band Show, the "most senior" marcher, and the best represented class. Kayla Motyka Bittle, clarinet player (class of 2011) from Sacramento, California, traveled the most miles in order to march with us. Once again, Ron Wahl and yours truly (class of 1966) were the oldest guys to march. The class of 2013 had the most marchers: thirteen.

The exclamation point to the evening was the Cuyahoga Falls High School Tiger Band. They were completely and totally awesome. Following the Band Show, the Tiger Band and the Alumni Band gathered in the cafeteria for our annual pizza party. It's always a pleasure (especially when there is food involved).

In all, we had 96 marchers, which was 4 more than the 92 that participated in 2012. Next year there shouldn't be a problem exceeding 100.

On behalf of the Alumni Band members and the committee I want to thank Brandon Duvall, Dustin Harris, and the IMP for their hard work preparing for the Band Show and the support that they have given us. I also want to thank the Cuyahoga Falls Board of Education, and the City of Cuyahoga Falls for their continued support.
