Band Show

Congratulations to the Pride Alumni Band for another outstanding performance at the 2015 Preview of Bands at Clifford Stadium on 11 August 2015.

Sunday was a huge success. We had a great turnout and both registration and practice in the south parking lot went very smoothly. It was a bit warm though. The temperature was in the mid-eighties with humidity about the same. With school beginning a week earlier than what everyone was used to, the band show was also moved up one week. It's possible that just one week could have made a difference in the daytime high. Former Tiger Band directors Mr. Brandon Duvall and Mr. Scott Curfman co-directed the Alumni Band at both practices and the band show. Sunday's practice was followed with a chicken dinner in the cafeteria.

Practice on Monday evening was held in the stadium. Rain was eminent. In fact, lightning was also a threat. The band was lucky to run through their routine twice. There was a steady downpour by the time practice ended. Personally, I thought that the rain felt refreshing compared to the heat on Sunday. A party followed at the Italian American Center on Ninth Street.

Tuesday night, the evening of the band show, finally arrived. As always, we had our picture taken in the bleachers under the Tiger emblem. The weather was great. The sky was clear and the daytime high had been seventy-eight. The pre-game show featured our very own, Tiger Band. The Alumni Band joined the Tiger Band for the playing of *The Star Spangled Banner*.

Following the pre-game show, the first band to perform was the Wildcat Band from Mogadore High School. Next was the St. Vincent-St. Mary Fighting Irish Band, followed by the Rough Rider Band from Kent Roosevelt High School. Then it was our turn.

When the Alumni Band was called to attention, they received a huge reception from both the crowd and the Tiger Band. I think that everyone in the band got an adrenaline rush from the cheering. The band did their running cadence on field followed by a jump halt and our fanfare. Randy Fillmore, the voice of the Pride Alumni Band, introduced us. He then dedicated the performance to the memories of Dean Sterling and Mike Corbissero who had passed away during the preceding year. After four bass drum beats, the band took off downfield playing the first segment of *Tiger Rag*. That was followed by the circle-drill *More* and a conversion that put the band into a concert formation.

Next, the band was able to catch their breaths during the presentation of the Pride Achievement Award. The 2015 recipient was Ron Wahl from the Class of 1966 AD. He was honored for his dedication to public service, a supporter of the Falls music programs, and for marching in almost every Preview of Band Shows for over forty years.

Playing of the concert number followed the award presentation. For the second year, the Pride Alumni Band Committee asked the band to vote online as to which song they wanted to play. First, during band show registration, each member was asked what song they would like to play as a concert number. From that, the committee compiled a master list, which was condensed to four songs based on different musical time periods. The final four consisted of *Never My Love* by the Association. *MacArthur Park* by Donna Summer. *We Are Young* by Fun. And the winner was *Somebody to Love* by Queen (arranged by Mr. Robert Feldbush). The voting process was such a huge success in 2014 that the committee is going to continue to ask for the band's input in the future.

After the concert number, there was another conversion that set up the remainder of *Tiger Rag*, the three-count turn around, stomp down, bow and extension. Again **THE CROWD WENT WILD.** This was followed by the running cadence off field, which led the band into J.W. Once again, the adrenaline kicked in and exhaustion wasn't a problem because **IT WAS ALL ABOUT BAND.**

Following the performance there was a ten-minute intermission in order for the crowd to regain their composure. In the second half, we were treated to the Springfield Spartan Band and the Bulldog Band from Green High School.

Next was the award presentation. The Alumni Band has three awards other than the Pride Achievement Award: the band member that travels the farthest to march in the band show, the "most senior" participant, and the best-represented class. Kristin Rickard from the class of 1994 traveled all the way from Saint Port Lucie, Florida. The "most senior" participant was June Cain from the class of 1952. The class of 2015 had the most marchers with 16.

The exclamation point to the evening was the Cuyahoga Falls High School Marching Tiger Band. They were completely and totally awesome. Following the band show, the Tiger Band and Alumni Band gathered in the cafeteria for our annual pizza party. It's always a pleasure for everyone.

In all, we had 123 members that participated in the show, which were 18 more than those who attended in 2014. Next year let's hope for at least 130.

On behalf of the Pride Alumni Band members and committee, I want to thank Brandon Duvall and Scott Curfman for their hard work and leadership. I also want to thank our announcer, Randy Fillmore, Marsha McKenna from the Falls-News Press, CIC, the IMP, Distinctive Images, and a special thanks to Dustin Harris and Courtney Lambert for their continued support.

History of the JW - Updated 2015

I am very proud and deeply honored that a drum cadence that I wrote so many years ago is still a part of the tradition and spirit of this great organization. Several times I have been asked to tell the story of how the 'JW' came about. I'd like to share it with you again briefly because, this year, there is a new chapter to that story.

Back In the summer of 1971, going into my senior year, I was inspired to write a 'rock 'n roll' drum cadence. Two songs, each with a drum solo as a signature part of the song gave special inspiration. The first song was 'Wipeout' by the Surfaris. The second was 'In-A-Gadda-Da-Vida' by Iron Butterfly. The Pride Alumni Band, just like the Black Tiger Marching Band always plays the JW as we exit the field after our show.

We also play it at the end of every parade, as we pass in front of the review stand.

Well, this year at the Stow Fourth of July parade, the 'JW' almost killed me, literally. At the end of the parade, as I was playing the lead tenor drum part in the 'JW', I felt some pain like really bad heartburn in my throat. By the time we finished the parade, I knew something more serious was wrong.

Some people might call this a coincidence, but I know that my heavenly Father put two Angels with skin there at the parade to be with me that day.

My new favorite Pride Alumni majorette, Melanie Kennedy, class of 1984, is a nurse in the heart catheter lab at Akron City hospital. Melanie was supposed to be working that day, but had traded days with another nurse in order to be at the parade. My new favorite Pride Alumni bass drummer, Eric Fawcett, class of 2003, works as a Paramedic for Sandusky County. They took charge and took care of me until the Stow Rescue Squad could get me to City Hospital. Melanie called her boss, my new cardiologist Dr. Hughes, to tell him that she was sending a 'special' patient and to get the catheter lab all ready.

The Stow Rescue Squad and ER confirmed that I was having a heart attack. The happy ending is that the catheter lab found one blocked artery, and they were able to fix it by deploying two stents. Because of everyone's quick and effective care, I did not suffer any permanent damage. I am now quite happily doing rehab exercise, not quite so happily modifying my diet. But I am looking forward to many more years playing with my Pride Alumni band and watching the Black Tiger Marching Band.
